Scouting for Everyone, a hands-on inclusion forum, will take place on January 16 - 17 at the Greater Los Angeles Area Council Cushman Watt Scout Center. The event offers practical strategies for embracing diversity, removing barriers, and ensuring every young person and family feels seen, heard, and valued. Attendees will hear inspiring stories from diverse Scouting communities, gain actionable tools, and learn how to strengthen Units and Councils through inclusion. MLK Day of Service, January 19

The annual Martin Luther King Jr. National Day of Service is January 19. Across Scouting America, units are planning service projects that reflect the values Dr. King championed. Scouts will take part in community cleanups, support local shelters and food programs, assist service organizations, and look for thoughtful ways to lift up neighbors who need a hand. It will be a

"Day On, Not a Day Off," and a chance for young people to show what service in action looks like.

Dr. King's connection to Scouting began in his youth when he was a member of Troop 151 in Atlanta. His time in Scouting helped nurture a spirit of leadership and community responsibility that would later define his work for justice and equality.

As we look ahead to MLK Day 2026, we encourage every unit to plan a project that reflects the heart of Dr. King's legacy. By serving with purpose, Scouts will honor his message and continue the work of building stronger and more caring communities.

Safeguarding Policies in Exploring Webinar, January 27

On Tuesday, January 27 at 8:00 p.m. ET, a webinar will clarify how 18- and 19-year-old Explorers, while subject to the same criminal background checks and safeguarding training as adult advisors, are not considered advisors and do not count toward two-deep leadership requirements. The session will examine how their legal adult status affects participation policies and interactions with younger Explorers. Featuring an interactive conversation with Glen Pounder, Chief Safeguarding Officer for Scouting America, the session will emphasize real-world questions and issues faced by units in the field, with time dedicated largely to participant Q&A. Cub Scout Roundtable Resources

Cub Scout Roundtable is a valuable opportunity for Cub Scout leaders to come together, share ideas, and learn about local events and activities that support their packs. Roundtables can be offered at the district or council level and may be held in person, virtually, or through a hybrid model. They can take place monthly or quarterly, giving councils and districts the flexibility to create a format that maximizes participation and meets local needs.

To further support Cub Scout Roundtables, the National Cub Scouting Committee has developed a library of Cub Scout Roundtable videos. These short, engaging videos—each 8 to

Ask A Commissioner

Q. The committee chair of the unit I serve is frustrated because he cannot get parents to volunteer as members of the committee. What should we do?

A. A unit commissioner can play a big part in helping encourage parents to step into committee roles, especially when families are used to dropping off their Scouts and leaving. Here are practical ways a commissioner can support the committee chair.

Build relationships - Spend a little time getting to know parents at meetings or events. When parents feel noticed and welcome, they are more open to being asked to help. You have to earn the right to be heard.

Promote small entry points - Parents often avoid volunteering because they fear a big commitment. Encourage the committee chair to offer very small tasks first, such as helping with one event or serving on a short project team. Once parents feel successful, they become more willing to take on a committee role.

Explain the purpose of the committee - Many parents do not understand how the committee supports the unit. The commissioner can help the committee chair give a clear and simple explanation of how the committee enables leaders to focus on the youth program.

Speak to parents directly - Sometimes parents respond better when the message comes from someone outside the unit. A commissioner can briefly share why parent involvement matters and how easy it is to contribute.

Highlight the benefit to their children - Parents are more willing to help when they understand that their participation strengthens their own Scout's experience. The commissioner can reinforce this point in conversations and at unit gatherings.

Recognize volunteers - Make sure the unit thanks committee members and celebrates their contributions. When parents see others appreciated for small jobs, they are more likely to want to be part of it. Reward the behaviors that you want to see engrained in the unit culture.

Attend a committee meeting - By attending a meeting, the commissioner can offer encouragement, share best practices, and help the chair present a clear plan for recruiting new members.
